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SYNOPSIS OF KVGs MEETINGS

We started the year off with Pre-publication flyers for the reprint of the 1883 Kankakee County Atlas. We ordered 750 copies of the atlas to make the price as reasonable as possible. We had approximately 120 orders during pre-publication, which helped to defray a little over one-third of the cost.

Genealogy Classes during February were very well attended with over 30 people registering. The February meeting was at the Kankakee Public Library working with their collection. The library has acquired a Martin Luther King collection, which has moved the genealogy collection from its own room into the Conference Room on the second floor of the library. The library has hired a new head librarian and a grant has helped the library to add to the genealogy collection. One major disadvantage has been access to the collection when a meeting is being held in the conference room.

The March meeting was presented by Michelle Cooper who spoke on preserving your pictures. Many useful tips were presented as well as ideas for displaying your photographs.

The April meeting was a video tape entitled "*Gift of Heritage*". Karen Burden reported she ordered a 3 volume set entitled "*Migration of Early New England Families 1620-1633*". With this set also comes the "Great Migration Newsletter". Total cost will be \$103.

The May meeting was a cemetery walk/checking of the Limestone Cemetery. Peg Paschke completed the reindexing of the 1883 Atlas and the Atlas was taken to the printer to start copying.

The June meeting was an audio tape on "*Genealogical Goldmine: The Records of Old Settlers' Organizations*". There were no regular meetings in July and August, but a Board Meeting was held in July.

At the September meeting Karen Burden presented a program on "*Where haven't you looked? Using little-known and neglected records*." Marcia Stang, Nelda Ravens and Sharla Gross volunteered to man a table at the Regional Conference at Governor's State University on September 23. The society sold approximately \$176 worth of publications at the conference. Karen Burden reported that Volume I of "The Great Migration Begins" has been received and she expects Volume II shortly.

The October meeting was a work meeting where checking of the Asbury Church records and the Herscher Centennial Book index were done. The Beecher Quasquicentennial Book came in and Peg Paschke donated several books to the collection including A Photographic Memory Book by St. Anne High School Class of 1934, Kankakee Centennial 1853-1953, Acadian Descendants Vol. X and several plat books and maps. A set of the Boudreau Books will be purchased for our collection.

The society is trying to get permission to do a reprint of the Herscher Centennial Book including a complete surname index. Other upcoming projects will be completion of the Ancestor Book and completion of the 1870 Census.

The December meeting will be a pot luck lunch at the Bourbonnais Library at 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 9. The society will provide the meat and beverage and members are asked to bring a dish to pass as well as their place setting. The program will be a slide presentation.

DEEDS

On the lower left hand corner of most old deeds you will find signatures of two to four witnesses. The first one is always from the husband's side. The next one is always from the wife's side. That is to protect her one-third dower rights under the law. Nothing you will ever use will give greater clues to maiden names than witnesses to old deeds. In addition, in the 1800's and before, it was traditional when the daughter married, as part of her dowry, for the father to either cover the loan or carry the note for his son-in-law. If you know the husband's name but not the wife's maiden name, find out to whom they made their mortgage payment. About 70% of the time, it will be her father. *SMCGS Newsletter, Vol. 13, No. 3, March 1995.*

1880 KANKAKEE COUNTY DEATHS

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette (publication date in parentheses).

(05 Feb 1880) Peter Enos, brother of R. H. Enos, of Kankakee, died at the tatter's home last week of consumption (Jan. 28 at 54 years of age). He was an old resident of this county, and had lived near Chebanse for a number of years. We have no further particulars of his life.

Mr. Enos was born in Owosco, Cayuga county, NY, March 24, 1822. When a boy ten years old, he moved west with his parents, who settled in the State of Michigan. In the year of 1853 he came to Illinois, and in 1955, he pre-empted a quarter section of government land, which is now the town of Chebanse, Iroquois county, the same that was his home at the time of his death. It is one of the best improved farms in Iroquois county. He never used ardent spirits of any kind, or tobacco in any shape whatever. He was a very industrious, energetic and persevering man, upright in deal with his fellow men. His word was as good as his bond; and a kind husband, a warm friend and an accommodating neighbor; liberal in his religious views; regretted leaving his wife and friends, but had no fear of death, and it was his imperative request that no religious ceremonies be performed over his remains.

(12 Feb 1880) In Cabery, January 29, of congestion of the brain, John Hoyt, aged 6 years.

(12 Feb 1880) In Sumner, Dec. 30, of heart disease, Louis Stetting, aged 58 years.

(12 Feb 1880) In Essex, Dec. 18, of inflammation of the bowels, Walter Brophy, aged 64 years.

(12 Feb 1880) Died, in Kankakee, February 8th, 1880, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. C. W. Johnson, after an illness of six days, J. S. Reynolds, of New Lenox, Will county, at the age of sixty-five years and three months. Thus has passed away another of the early settlers of Illinois. His father, J. S. Reynolds, Sr., located in what is now the town of New Lexon in 1832 with three sons, of whom the deceased was the youngest, who continued to reside at the old homestead until after the death of his wife, three years ago.

(19 Feb 1880) In Salina, Feb. 9, of erysipelas, infant son of R. H. and Josephine Hawker, aged 2 months.

(19 Feb 1880) The death of two infants, aged respectively 14 and 21 days, in Limestone on the 14th and 22d of last August has just been returned by the father, Louis Dohn. The cause of death is recorded as "unknown". It seems that there was neither physician or undertaker.

(26 Feb 1880) In Ganeer, Jan. 27, of typhoid fever, Amanda St. Aubin, aged four years.

(26 Feb 1880) In Kankakee, Feb 15, Ida Klutz, aged 9 days. Cause of death unknown.

(26 Feb 1880) In Norton, Feb. 12, of scarletina, Charles D. Stewart, aged 8 years, 10 months.

(26 Feb 1880) In Momence, Feb. 6, of consumption, William Schoof, aged 52 years.

(26 Feb 1880) In Waldron, Jan. 16, of congestion of the brain, Stephen Harrison, aged 9 months.

(26 Feb 1880) In Kankakee, Feb. 8, of pluro-pneumonia, Smith Reynolds, aged 66 years.

(26 Feb 1880) In Aroma, Feb. 17, of lung fever, Raymond L., son of Lucius M. and Olive S. Case, aged 4 years.

Benj. Goodwin will ship two more car loads of hogs tonight. There are 81 in the lot and it took 21 wagons-loads to carry them to the railroad. He says he got the best price in the yard for those shipped last week.

A 5 1 /2 lb. boy at Obe. Lancasters is creating considerable excitement. Name him Nebuchadnessar, then the name will make up what the boy lacks in size, and he will average better.

Freddie Mann talks of going to Janesville, Wis., to learn telegraphing.

Our young friend, George Shreffler, has bought the John Guilford farm at Deselm's corners. That looks a little suspicious, George. Going to keep "bach," eh?

Mr. Henry Tudor, the soap man, talks of locating in Kankakee for the purpose of manufacturing "Tudor's labor-saving soap." A soap factory will be something new to Kankakee we presume.

Will Bilyard has sold his goods and will start in a few days, by rail, for Iowa.

TELEPHONIC - 1880

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, February 5, 1880

The telephone is becoming quite a feature in the business facilities of Kankakee. The latest in that direction is a line between the paper mill and Mr. Crawford's residence on "Quality hill," connecting also with the store of H. L. Crawford & Co., on Court street. The instrument will be an Edison electric, and a mile and a half of wire will be required. The line will run up West avenue on its own poles, thence east on Court street on the American Union's poles. By the way, the Western Union wanted \$10 per month for the use of fourteen poles, while the American Union give the use of about forty free of charge. The Paper Mill company is a liberal patron of the Western Union, and a different disposition should have been shown on the part of the latter. A great many complaints have been lodged against the Western Union by our Kankakee business men during the past few years. The opening of the American Union's office will create a healthy competition.

Harry Crawford and Duff Sherman are going to put up a line between their residences, and the Gazette will soon have a wire from the foot of the stairs to the editorial room.

KANKAKEE STATE HOSPITAL

Our society was informed some time ago that the old records from the Kankakee State Hospital (now Shapiro Mental Health Center) were sent to the State Archives in Springfield. I have passed that information along to many people who were researching their ancestors. Last month one gentleman was good enough to tell me the results of his search. He wrote to the State Archives, who passed his inquiry along to the Illinois State Historical Library. They referred him to Shapiro for the records. When he wrote to Shapiro, he was informed that all records prior to 1955 were destroyed in a fire. They confirmed that they have a cemetery with graves marked only by number. Since the records were destroyed, they have no idea who is buried in the cemetery prior to 1955.

I'd like to hear from any of our members who were told the same or different information about these records so we can track down what really happened.

work, his subsequent followers being J. Hinman in 1845; Rev. Chapin, in 1846; E. Lewis; C. Lazenby, in 1848; S. R. Burr, in 1849-50; George Homes, in 1851; and George Murphy, in 1852.

Chester Reeder, who was appointed pastor in 1853, found a Sunday school class organized with William Bowdle, as leader, and containing the following pupils: William Bishop, Rebecca Bishop, William and Rebecca Legg, William and Rebecca Durham, William Sutcliffe, Eliza Sutcliffe, William Bowdle, C. A. Bowdle, John Bishop, Maria Bishop, Mercy Lamb, Louisa Tart.

At this time the services of the society were held in the second story of the Illinois Central depot, and in 1854 the place of worship was changed to the home of William Bishop. In 1854 and 1855 James McClane was pastor, and during the latter year plans were laid for the building of a church, upon a lot donated by the Associate Land company. In the fall of 1855 the church was dedicated, the same being now the old city hall, on Dearborn avenue, south of Court street. In the fall of 1855 Rev. McClane was succeeded by David Cassady. The conference of 1858 sent B. F. Cleveland to Kankakee, and G. L. S. Stuff succeeded Rev. Cleveland in 1860. Upon the appointment of Rev. Stuff as chaplain of the army, in 1862, Rev. J. W. Flowers became pastor of the church, and he, in turn, was appointed chaplain, being succeeded by E. Stone. In the fall of 1863 Rev. S. G. Havermale was appointed pastor, in 1865 being succeeded by Joseph Hartwell. It was in this year that the new church was begun, upon the lot at the northeast corner of Harrison avenue and Merchant street, donated by Mr. and hire. James McGrew.

After much time spent in discussing plans, the official board took decisive action on the evening of December 12, 1867; when a building committee was appointed consisting of James McGrew, John Durham, John Dale, L. B. Cobb and I. N. Dickson. With such a committee success was assured.

Through the magnificent generosity of David Woodard stone for the church was taken from his quarry in Kankakee, this being recognized as worthy the man who gave it, and of sufficient magnitude to enshrine his memory in the heart of every Methodist in Kankakee. The lot and stone assured, success seemed imminent to this zealous body of Christians.

Plans were made by Mr. Kinny, of Chicago, and William Hamilton, of Kankakee, was made superintendent of construction under the building committee. Great preparations were made for laying the cornerstone for which ceremony Drs. Tiffany and Hartwell were engaged as speakers. Immediately after noon, on Thursday May 28, 1867, a procession marched to the church from the Empire block, and a choir, recruited from the various city churches, took its place upon the improvised platform. After a hymn, a prayer was offered by Dr. Tiffany, and Grand Master Gorin, of the Masonic fraternity, gave a brief address. Rev. Hartwell then read the following list of articles which were deposited in the cornerstone: A Bible, The Centenary of Methodism, Sermon on the death of Thomas Lokie, Methodist Quarterly Review, Christian Advocate and Journal, Western Christian Advocate, Methodist Episcopal Hymn book, Methodist Episcopal Discipline, Sunday School Advocate, Guide to Holiness, Methodist Almanac, Sunday School Report, a history of the church to date, list of church officers, copies each of the Chicago Tribune, Kankakee Gazette and Journal, a piece of gold quartz presented by D. D. L. McCulloch, and documents from the Odd Fellows, Sons of Temperance and Goad Templars. When these articles had been deposited the stone was put into place.

In the meantime the old church building had been sold to the board of education for three thousand five hundred dollars, and during its temporary homelessness the congregation worshiped in Durham's hall. When, however, the basement of the new church had been completed, services were held therein, pending the erection of the main portion of the edifice, since used by the congregation.

In October, 1867, Rev. Hartwell was succeeded by the Rev. J. S. Moore. The great stone church was now nearing completion, but the subscriptions thus far were inadequate. Rather than have the work retarded, a meeting of the congregation was held December 14, 1867, of which Rev. Moore was chairman and J. B. Welch secretary. A resolution was adopted authorizing the board of trustees to negotiate a loan of ten thousand dollars from Albert G. Hobble, with interest at the rate of tea per

cent per annum. This note, signed by the members of the board of trustees, is a treasured heirloom, soiled and worn along the folds from much handling, and it's back covered with closely written acknowledgments of interest. Across the left side of the face is written a huge PAID, which in after years sent joy to the hearts of those who had so long been crushed under its burden. Among the endorsements mentioned is that of interest to the amount of eight thousand, four hundred and twenty-nine dollars. It is doubtless true that this time-yellowed note has cost the church at least twenty thousand dollars.

This note was secured by a trust deed to Harrison Loring, executed on December 23, 1867, and by a document in which John Durham, James McGrew, John Dale; L. B. Cobb, Welsey Bonfield and I. N. Dickson bound themselves, heirs or administrators, to the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, to see that the note was paid. As the church was nearing completion the official board selected March 1, 1868, for the dedication, and former pastors of the church as well as the various clergymen of the city were invited to attend. That prince of Methodist clergymen, Dr. T. M. Eddy, was chosen to dedicate the church. Immediately after the arrival of Mr. Eddy, on Saturday evening, February 29, he met the official board and a study into the financial conditions of the church was entered into. The statement that nearly thirty thousand dollars were to be raised on the morrow was met by Dr. Eddy with the announcement that he could not hope to raise that amount unless the board would pledge one-third of it. The members, rather than have a failure on the morrow, took up willingly the extra burden. A crowded house greeted Dr. Eddy in the morning and listened to a magnificent discourse on the power of Christ through the church. The collection which followed was not what had been hoped for, although Dr. Eddy's peerless ability in this line was enlisted in the work. Rev. A. J. Judkins preached in the evening, and this discourse was followed by another effort to raise money, but when the day had passed there was still an indebtedness of fully fifteen thousand dollars bearing interest at ten per cent per annum. Subsequent subscriptions failed to bring material relief, and the church labored on, paying from one thousand to fifteen hundred dollars interest every year; beside its current expenses. One after

another the fortunes of the leading members vanished under their voluntary obligations, but they saved a little out of the wreck and paid their church subscriptions until the debt was canceled. New members came to help, and although it does not appear how it was done, the work went on and Methodism survives today stronger, more hopeful and more vigorous than ever before.

The laborious pastorate of Rev. Moore terminated with the conference year. The Rock River conference was held in the new church, Bishop Simpson presiding. Rev. W. D. Atchinson was appointed to the pastorate, and his successors were as follows: A. P. Mead, in 1871; J. O. Foster, in 1872; John Adams, in 1873; T. R. Strowbridge, in 1874; William A. Smith, in 1876; A. J. Judkins, in 1878; N. H. Axtell, in 1880; C. E. Glendenning, in 1883, and Conrad Haney, in 1886.

Rev. Haney was succeeded in 1890 by T. W. McVety, and in 1893 Rev. Hyre D. Clark became pastor. In 1894 M. A. Head succeeded. Dr. Clark. Thos. Doney was appointed pastor in 1895, W. V. Crumbaker in 1898, and Rev. Clark was again appointed pastor in 1900, and was succeeded by B. Barrett Evans in 1903.

The church property is valued at \$47,000. The parsonage cost \$5,000. The membership of the church is five hundred thirty-flue, and that of the Sabbath school, flue hundred. The total contribution last year amounted to \$5,700.00.

The First Methodist church has a mission fa East Kankakee, known as the Riverview chapel. The building, which is valued at \$1,500, was dedicated May 19, 1901. There is a Sabbath school of one hundred members, and the total contribution last year amounted to \$126.

The Trinity Methodist Episcopal church, of Kankakee, was organized, and the church built in 1871, from the First Methodist Episcopal church. The first pastor was John Dale, who has been succeeded by the following: T. C. Young, A. B. Smart, W. K. Hodley, Rev. Allen. Rev. Chipperfield, W. K. Collins, Joe well, J. C. Taylor; John Rogers, B. F. Eckley, W. D. Benjamin, W. J. Minium, and J. G. Evans, present pastor.

The church property is valued at \$3,000; the parsonage is valued at \$2,000. There is s membership in the church of one hundred and forty-six; Sabbath School, one hundred and

thirty. Total contribution last year, \$2,095. Trinity church has a mission at Otto, Illinois, which building is valued at \$1,000.

BRADLEY

The Methodist Episcopal church at Bradley was organized in 1892. The following pastors have served the church: T. H. Pryon; N. W. Atkins, W. G. Miller, C. A. Wright, J. W. Minium, W. S. Reed, A. H. Smith, M. Katherine Riggs, G. H. McClung and H. M. Bloomer, the present pastor.

The present membership is one hundred and fifty; Sabbath school, one hundred and seventy-flue.

The church property is valued at \$2,800. About \$900 was required this year to carry on the church work.

GRANT PARK

The charge at Grant Park includes the Grant Park and Sherburnville churches. It was organized at Yellowhead, a point two miles southeast of Grant Park, in December, 1838, by Rev. John Clark. The church was moved to Grant Park and the present building erected in 1875. The church at Sherburnville was organized and built in 1883, by Rev. G. K. Hover. Before 1883 the head of the circuit was at Momence. Following is the list of pastors of the churches at Grant Park and Sherburnville since 1883: In 1883 T. H. Hazelton was appointed pastor and served **six** months when he was succeeded by J. S. Bell, who served the remainder of the year; F. H. Haley, in 1884; L. M. Cleon, 1885-88; R. L. Vivian, 1886-90; J. E. Taylor, 1890-93; A. W. Lowther, 1893-95; M. A. Hood, 1896; B. F. Eckley, 1896-98; J. G. Evans, 1898-1903; J. S. White, 1903—.

The present membership at Grant Park is one hundred and twenty; Sabbath school, one hundred and twenty-flue. Membership at Sherburnville is thirty; Sabbath school, sixty. The church spends annually for pastor's salary, benevolence and incidental expenses, \$2,400. The church property at Grant Park is valued at \$7,600, and at Sherburnville, \$2,500.

MANTENO

The Methodist Episcopal church in Manteno was organized in 1865. The building now occupied

was built in 1872, at a cost oL \$7,000. The following men have served this pastorate: Rev. Wallace, O. E. Burch, H. W. Reynolds, J. Harris, S. Washburne, John Tassett, Joseph Wardle, B. M. Winslow, R. R. Bibbins, John O. Foster, Rev. Gillespie, John Nate, A. T. Horn. Rev. Olmstead, E. G. Catermole, 1885-87; John Small, 1887-90; S. P. Alford, 1890-92; J. B. Bartle, 189-94; I. W. Imboden, 1895; W. F. Jameston, 1895-97; John May, 1897-99; J. C. Zeller, 1899-1902; M. M. McCreight, 1902-04; H. C. Burch, 1904.

There is a membership of one hundred two with a Sabbath school of eighty. The church expended for all purposes last year \$1,171. The church property is valued at \$7,600; parsonage at \$2,500.

BONFIELD

The Bonfield charge was organized in 1860 with Rev. Day as its first pastor. It now comprises Essex, Reddick and Bonfield, and the following pastors have served:

Dawson, 1884; M. T. Fulch, 188G; C. B. Allen, 1887; W. C. McCurdy, 1888; E. H. Alford, 1889; D. W. Francis, 1891; J. Wallet Puffer, 1893; N. W. Atkins, 1895; H. Coolidge, 1899; A. R. Jones, 1902; and 1904, C. W. Cordes, who is the present pastor.

The church. at Bonfield has a membership of fifty, Sabbath school of eighty-five. The church property is valued at \$4,000. Total Contributions last -year amounted to \$363.

The church, at Essex has a membership of forty; Sunday school, eighty-flue. Church value, \$5,000. Contributions, =400.

At Reddick the church has a membership of fifty; Sunday school, ninety; church property, \$5,000; contributions, \$400,
